MISSION STATEMENT

AMCHAM's mission statement derives from the Chamber's Articles of Association, which were originally generated in 1978 by the Chamber's founders. AMCHAM is the voice of U.S. businesses in Malaysia. The Chamber provides relevant business information to its members and actively serves as a platform to represent members' interests to Malaysian and U.S. stakeholders. It organizes a host of business and social networking events, allowing members to interact and foster closer relations with Malaysian businesses and local communities.

AMCHAM's objectives are:

- To promote and develop mutually-prosperous commercial, cultural and community relations between American and Malaysian businesses and organizations;
- To provide a forum for discussing and exchanging views on business conditions, both domestic and international, which affect members' interests;
- To promote, foster, support, represent, and protect the interests of AMCHAM's member companies;
- To represent and express members' views on trade and related issues to U.S. and Malaysian Government representatives; and

- To provide resources, networking opportunities and support for the American business community in Malaysia. AMCHAM services cover four key areas: advocacy and government relations, communications, events and programs, and corporate social responsibility (CSR) programs.

The Mission of the Chamber is focused on the following areas:

1. ADVOCACY AND GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

As an advocate for its members' interests, AMCHAM raises key issues and concerns with the Malaysian and U.S. Governments and has gathered information on policy issues to promote trade and investment between both countries. Through Industry Committees within AMCHAM and through working one-on-one with Chamber members, AMCHAM helps to identify important regulatory issues that impact operations and foreign direct investments in Malaysia. It works with members to develop white papers and communications strategies to share with Government officials on the types of policies that can further help grow Malaysia's economy and foreign investment opportunities. AMCHAM works very closely with the Malaysian Government, participating in dialogues and roundtable discussions to provide information on American

business investments, to advise on regulatory policies and to raise issues of concern to AMCHAM members.

The Chamber has a close partnership with the U.S. Embassy in Kuala Lumpur, and with key U.S. Government agencies in Washington, DC (e.g., Department of Commerce, Department of State, Office of the U.S. Trade Representative, etc.) AMCHAM also advocates for the interests of Americans living abroad, including on the issue of U.S. citizens being taxed overseas by the United States.

2. COMMUNICATIONS

AMCHAM's website is maintained to increase the ease of membership communication with the Executive Office. Our other stakeholders remain as equally important partners in our mission to promote a better and friendlier business environment. AMCHAM continues to keep members abreast with what is happening within the business community as well as the various initiatives of the Malaysian Government to improve policies for businesses. We issue press releases and commentaries on key economic topics.

3. EVENTS & PROGRAMS

AMCHAM's events and programs have been mapped out to fall in line with our mission to promote key issues. AMCHAM organizes business briefings and networking events each month for its members. These events feature senior business and government leaders in forums designed to provide members with up-to-date information on business issues, sectoral analysis, etc.

AMCHAM invites Government speakers to provide an opportunity for AMCHAM members to understand policy developments, U.S. Government activities in Washington, D.C., and other relevant areas. The Chamber aims to hold a monthly networking event, which facilitates opportunities for members to get to know each other and explore potential business opportunities in a more relaxed setting. AMCHAM

also organizes seminars and conferences for a more in-depth look at key economic and business issues affecting the Malaysian and global economies.

MY AMCHAM CARES

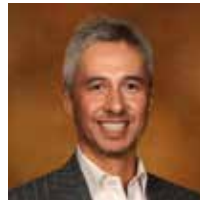

2025 saw another year of growth for the Chamber with revenue approaching the RM3.5 million mark. Receipts from membership dues remained the primary revenue driver and this was also the highest amount recorded by the Chamber thus far. Indeed, this was achieved with the solid support of all our members and we truly appreciate your contributions. During the year, the Chamber also welcomed more than 30 new companies into our membership.

This positive trajectory was, nevertheless, partially constrained by a drop in other income. Within this category, events sponsorships and ticket sales made up the highest proportion, contributing 71% of its total. In 2025, events sponsorships declined and coupled with the effect of income from one-off events in the previous year, the overall income from events was 32% lower. In contrast to the lower sponsorships, we earned higher interest income from our fixed deposits and this mitigated the impact of the reduction in other income.

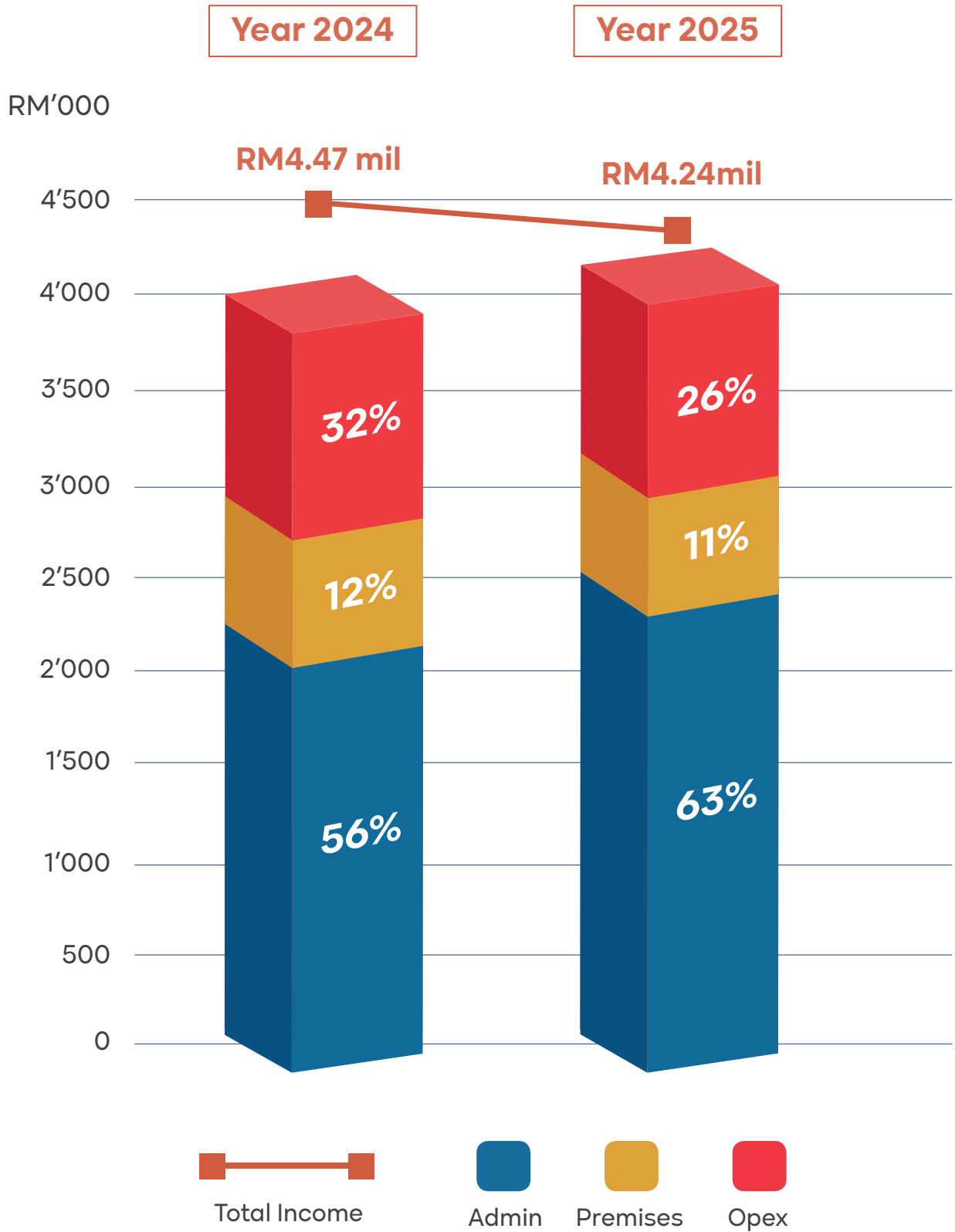
On the expenditure side, the Chamber's overall expenses recorded a marginal increase of 3.3%. A portion of this expansion in cost came from higher personnel expenses. While staff costs registered a rise of 14%, this was in line with our strategy to optimize the skills mix of the Executive Office team. This initiative to develop higher internal capabilities was designed to drive higher value creation in the longer term as we planned for even more meaningful engagements with our stakeholders.

Despite the higher expenditure on staffing, we benefited from some cost savings in the other areas. Through the implementation of cost-optimization measures, the Chamber's office and operational expenses contracted by 13%. This reduction in overheads helped to cushion the higher costs incurred on personnel.

Apart from the routine monthly expenses, the Chamber allocated some portions of its earnings towards capital expenditure. These purchases, in the form of new furniture and replacement of old computers, were to ensure the smooth running of our day-to-day operations.

As we navigate the increasingly uncertain global outlook, we maintain a cautious yet disciplined approach. We remain committed to utilizing our core capabilities to drive advocacy and deliver sustainable, long-term value. Against this backdrop, we extend our sincere gratitude to our members for their invaluable contributions, as their continued partnership remains central to the achievement of the Chamber's objective.

ADVOCACY

In 2025, AMCHAM remained at the forefront of policy and regulatory engagement, working closely with our members and key Malaysian ministries and agencies to address issues critical to competitiveness, investment, and long-term economic resilience. Amid evolving global trade dynamics, digital transformation, and increasing supply chain scrutiny, the Chamber continued to serve as a trusted platform bridging industry perspectives with national policy priorities.

Malaysia's position as a strategic hub for advanced manufacturing, digital services, and high-value investment remained central to our advocacy. AMCHAM supported efforts to enhance regulatory clarity, strengthen ease of doing business, and reinforce Malaysia's attractiveness as a preferred investment destination. Key areas of focus included trade facilitation, tax predictability, supply chain resilience, talent, and the broader investment ecosystem.

In 2025, Malaysia continued to advance its economic priorities through key policy developments and forward planning initiatives, including ongoing implementation of the New Industrial Master Plan (NIMP) 2030, consultations shaping the 13th Malaysia Plan (RMK13) and Budget 2026. These efforts reflect a continued focus on strengthening industrial capabilities, enhancing sustainability, and reinforcing Malaysia's competitiveness in a rapidly evolving global environment. AMCHAM actively supported these processes by providing industry perspectives, facilitating dialogue between stakeholders, and contributing to policy discussions to ensure that

evolving frameworks remain practical, forward-looking, and aligned with business realities.

Trade, regulatory, and structural reforms remained a key focus of AMCHAM's advocacy in 2025, as the Chamber continued to support Malaysia's competitiveness in an increasingly complex global landscape. AMCHAM contributed to broader policy discussions aimed at enhancing the efficiency, clarity, and predictability of the business environment, particularly in areas impacting trade, investment, and industrial operations. In parallel, the Chamber deepened its engagement on forward-looking priorities, including sustainability and digital transformation, supporting national efforts to strengthen resilience, drive innovation, and position Malaysia as a future-ready and trusted hub within regional and global value chains.

Looking ahead to 2026, AMCHAM will continue to support its members in navigating an increasingly uncertain global environment marked by evolving trade measures, tariff pressures, and shifting supply chain dynamics. As businesses adapt to these changes, the need for clear policy direction, regulatory consistency, and a competitive operating environment will be more important than ever. In this context, AMCHAM remains committed to strengthening engagement between industry and policymakers, ensuring that business perspectives are reflected in policy development, and supporting Malaysia's continued progress as a reliable and forward-looking investment destination within the region and beyond.

AMCHAM continued to represent its members diligently in 2025 through consistent, solutions-oriented advocacy and close engagement with key government stakeholders. These working-level engagements strengthened collaboration between industry and policymakers, ensuring that business concerns were addressed constructively and in a timely manner.

Through its advocacy initiatives, AMCHAM provided members with timely, on-the-ground insights into regulatory developments and the broader economic landscape, while conveying clear and practical industry feedback to relevant authorities.

Our key policy engagements and priority areas in 2025 include the following:

- AMCHAM engaged **MITI** on Malaysia's economic resilience, global positioning, and competitiveness amid evolving trade dynamics. Discussions focused on supply chain resilience, regulatory efficiency, talent development, and strengthening Malaysia's value proposition as an investment destination.
- The Chamber engaged the **Ministry of Finance** on the proposed SST expansion, highlighting concerns on exemptions, tax cascading, and implementation clarity. AMCHAM also submitted industry recommendations for Budget 2026, covering competitiveness, reinvestment incentives, digital and AI adoption, and cost of doing business.
- AMCHAM worked closely with **MITI, MOF, and RMCD** to address operational challenges within the Licensed Manufacturing Warehouse (LMW) framework, advocating for greater standardization, digitalization, and alignment with current manufacturing practices.
- AMCHAM remains grateful for the continued collaboration and support from our partners across government, industry, and the broader policy ecosystem, including **MITI, MOF, RMCD, MIDA, the Ministry of Digital, NRES, MPC, TalentCorp, and others**. We also thank our members for their active participation and valuable insights, which enable AMCHAM to advocate effectively on behalf of the U.S.–Malaysia business community.

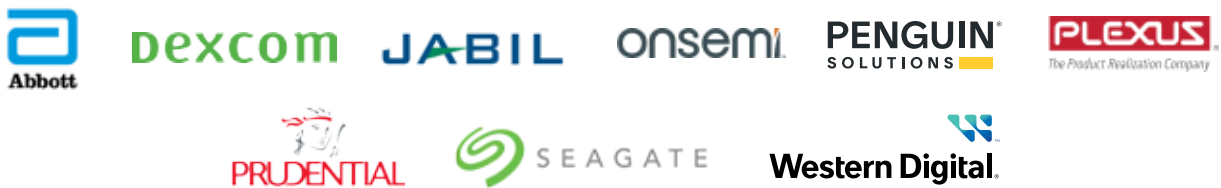
